Director

Chair & CEO Report

The 2025 season represented a significant and, at times, complex year for football across Canberra and the surrounding region. While the game continued to deliver strong competition outcomes and community engagement, the year also required careful planning and decision-making to address emerging challenges and support the long-term sustainability of the sport.

Across all levels of the game, from MiniRoos and junior leagues through to senior competitions, National Premier League and Capital Premier League, the season showcased the depth, quality and connection of the football community. Competitions were highly competitive across all divisions, with strong performances and memorable moments from the opening Charity Shield fixtures through to the conclusion of finals series competitions. We extend our congratulations to all premiers, champions and award recipients across the season.

Community football remains the foundation of the game in the ACT. The continued growth in participation, particularly across junior and youth competitions, reflects the strength of club environments and the dedication of volunteers, coaches, match officials and administrators. Their ongoing contribution ensures that football remains accessible, inclusive and connected across the region.

At the same time, the 2025 season highlighted challenges in areas such as team sustainability, competition balance and participation pressures in certain cohorts. In response, Capital Football confirmed changes to Premier League competition structures for the 2026 season. While these decisions prompted discussion within the football community, they represent an important step toward ensuring a more stable and sustainable future.

The development pathway continued to be a key focus throughout 2025. The Talent Development Scheme and High Performance programs were expanded, providing increased opportunities for

players to access structured, high-performance environments. Capital Football was represented at both the Emerging Socceroos and Emerging Matildas Championships, with teams demonstrating resilience and progression across national competition, including a fourth-place finish in the Under 16 Girls competition.

Coach education also remained a priority, with a full suite of community and advanced courses delivered throughout the year. The introduction of a female-only C Diploma program, supported by Football Australia, represented an important step in strengthening opportunities for women within the coaching pathway.

Refereeing continued to show strong progression, with Capital Football officials appointed across national and international competitions, including FIFA World Cup Qualifiers, AFC competitions and A-League fixtures. These appointments reflect the continued strength of the officiating pathway within the region, supported by ongoing development and education programs.

Futsal experienced continued growth in 2025, with strong participation across both senior and junior competitions and increasing engagement in the Capital Futsal League. Capital Football was well represented at the National Futsal Championships, where the Open Women's Blue team secured the national title, highlighting the quality and progression of the futsal pathway.

The Kanga Cup once again delivered a successful tournament, bringing together teams from across Australia and internationally in a week-long celebration of football. The event continues to be a cornerstone of the football calendar and a significant contributor to community engagement and economic activity within the ACT.

At the elite level, Canberra United continued to represent the region in the A-League Women's competition. As the only Member Federation to

operate its own A-League club, Capital Football continues to manage the increasing demands of the professional environment. While the organisation remains committed to supporting elite women's football, the ongoing sustainability of this model requires continued collaboration with key stakeholders.

During 2025, Capital Football established a Strategic Partnerships and Infrastructure function, reflecting a renewed focus on strengthening relationships across government, industry and the broader community. This work will be critical in addressing long-term challenges, particularly in facilities provision and supporting the continued growth of the game.

In addition, work commenced on the development of Behavioural Standards, with implementation planned for 2026. These standards will strengthen expectations around respect, integrity and positive conduct across the football community, supporting safe, inclusive and welcoming environments at all levels of the game.

Capital Football also undertook consultation on its next Strategic Plan, to be released in 2026. This process engaged stakeholders across the game and will guide the organisation's future direction, ensuring alignment with community needs and long-term priorities.

The year also saw changes within the Board, with the resignation of Deputy Chair Elizabeth Hovsapien. We thank Elizabeth for her contribution and service to Capital Football. We welcome Adrian King and Peter Maybury to the Board, and acknowledge the re-election of Gary Vandeburgt and Kim Ward, whose ongoing involvement provides valuable continuity and experience.

We thank our valued sponsors and partners for their ongoing support throughout the season, as well as the Capital Football Board, staff, Standing Advisory Committees and the wider football community for their continued commitment. The dedication of volunteers across all levels of the game remains fundamental to the success of football in the ACT.

While challenges remain, the work undertaken throughout 2025 provides a strong foundation for the future. As we look ahead to 2026, the focus will remain on strengthening competitions, supporting clubs and continuing to build a sustainable and inclusive football environment for all participants.

Competitions



Overview

The 2025 Capital Football season across the OPC IT National Premier League and Capital Premier League competitions delivered a year of quality competition and key moments across all divisions. From the opening Charity Shield fixtures through to the regular season and finals series, teams competed strongly across both senior and pathway competitions.

Across all levels of the game, the season reflected ongoing participation in football in the ACT and the connection between clubs, players and their communities. While many competitions remained highly competitive, the year also highlighted challenges facing clubs and competitions, particularly in maintaining playing numbers and team sustainability in certain areas.

Changes to the Premier League competition formats for the 2026 season were confirmed during 2025. While these changes generated discussion across the football community, they are intended to support the ongoing development and long-term sustainability of the competitions. Looking ahead to 2026, the focus will be on supporting clubs, strengthening competition structures, and implementing these changes to build greater consistency across the game in the ACT.

Capital Football would like to thank all clubs, volunteers, parents, participants and members of the Standing Advisory Committee for their ongoing efforts and support throughout the 2025 season. Their contribution continues to play a vital role in the delivery and development of football across the region, and we look forward to building on this in the 2026 season.



Charity Shields

The 2025 Charity Shield fixtures marked the beginning of the Capital Football season, bringing together leading clubs across youth and senior competitions while supporting Sock it to Sarcoma, a charity that holds special significance in memory of referee Cameron Shelton. The matches provided an early opportunity to showcase the upcoming season and highlight the connection between football and the wider community.

The event also extended across futsal, where the Charity Shield reflected the strong connection within the futsal community and the broader football network.

The OPC IT NPL Men's competition in 2025 consisted of two divisions – First Grade and Under 23's – and delivered a competitive season, marked by consistency at the top of the table and a closely contested race for finals positions across much of the year.

Following the regular season, Canberra Croatia FC secured the OPC IT NPL Men's Premiership, finishing top of the ladder through a campaign built on consistent performances across the year.

Clubs including Canberra Croatia FC, Tigers FC and Monaro Panthers FC remained competitive throughout the season, contributing to a tight race for both Premiership and finals positions.

In the OPC IT NPL Under 23 Men's competition, O'Connor Knights SC claimed the premiership, finishing on top of the table following the regular season.

The finals series provided a strong conclusion to the campaign, with competitive matches across both divisions.

In the OPC IT Women's NPL competitions, the 2025 season presented a mixed landscape, with strong performances at the top end of the competition alongside ongoing challenges in participation and competition sustainability.

While the competition expanded to eight teams, the season was also marked by the loss of a club and the withdrawal of a Reserve Women's side, highlighting the ongoing challenges faced by clubs in maintaining playing numbers and squad depth. These pressures were evident across both divisions and impacted overall competition stability throughout the season.

The OPC IT NPL Women's competition continues to operate across two divisions – First Grade and Reserves – both of which play a critical role in providing development and performance pathways for female players within the region.

Despite these challenges, leading clubs again demonstrated strong on-field performance. Belconnen United FC secured the OPC IT NPL Women's Premiership following a dominant 2025 campaign, while Canberra Croatia FC finished top of the table in the OPC IT NPL Reserve Women's competition.

Clubs such as Belconnen United FC, Canberra Croatia FC and Canberra Olympic FC remained competitive across both divisions, contributing to the overall standard of play throughout the season.

The Capital Premier League Men's competition in 2025 consisted of two divisions – First Grade and Under 23's – and continued to play an important role within the competition pathway, providing a competitive environment for clubs aspiring to NPL qualification.

Across the season, the league was characterised by closely contested matches and shifting momentum, with several clubs demonstrating the capacity to challenge for honours.

Belconnen United FC claimed the First Grade Premiership following a consistent campaign. In the Under 23 Men's competition, ANU FC secured the premiership, finishing top of the table at the conclusion of the regular season.

The 2025 season also carried additional significance, with the top three First Grade teams earning automatic promotion into the expanded NPL competition for the 2026 season.



NPL Youth

The NPL Boys and Girls competitions continued to showcase football development across the region, highlighting the strength of club pathways and the emergence of the next generation of players.

In 2025, the Boys competition expanded to 14 teams following the temporary alignment of the CPL and NPL Boys competitions into a single structure for the season. This provided increased opportunities for match play and broader exposure across the pathway.

Queanbeyan City FC and Canberra Croatia FC contested the Men's Federation Cup Final, with the winner earning the right to represent the region in the Hahn Australia Cup Round of 32.

Played under lights at McKellar Park in front of a strong crowd, the match was closely contested throughout. The match was level at full time, with Canberra Croatia FC ultimately confirmed as champions after extra time, securing the title in dramatic fashion and adding another chapter to their history in the competition.

Canberra Croatia FC represented the Capital Football region in the Hahn Australia Cup Round of 32, earning the opportunity to compete against South Australian NPL Champions MetroStars on the national stage.

In front of a strong home crowd at Deakin Stadium, Croatia faced a high-quality opponent and were ultimately defeated 4 – 0, bringing their Australia Cup campaign to a close.

Despite the result, participation at this stage of the competition provided valuable exposure for the club and the local competition, highlighting the pathway for ACT teams to compete nationally.



Australian Championships

On the national stage, Canberra Croatia FC represented Capital Football in the 2025 Australian Championship (National Second Tier), competing against leading clubs from across the country in the inaugural edition of the competition.

The campaign provided valuable experience at national level, with Croatia facing Avondale FC, NWS Spirit FC and Preston Lions FC across the group stage.

Canberra Croatia FC recorded a notable 3 – 2 victory over Preston Lions FC at Deakin Stadium, highlighting their ability to compete strongly against established interstate opposition.

Their participation highlighted the opportunity for ACT clubs to compete within the national second-tier structure and provided an important benchmark for continued development at both club and league level.

Community Leagues

SAP Competition

The Skill Acquisition Phase (SAP) competition provided a structured development environment for U13 players across both Open and Girls divisions, with teams competing in midweek and weekend fixtures alongside a focus on technical training.

The competition delivered consistent game time for players, supporting their development throughout the season. Progression was evident across the period from May to September, with players demonstrating improvement in key technical and game-based skills.

The season concluded with the SAP Gala Weekend, providing an opportunity to showcase development outcomes across the competition in a festival-style environment.



Junior Leagues and MiniRoos

The 2025 Junior Leagues and MiniRoos competitions continued to play an important role in participation across the Capital Football region.

The MiniRoos program provided a fun, inclusive and development-focused environment, introducing young players to football through small-sided games that emphasised skill development, teamwork and enjoyment.

As players progressed through the junior leagues, the competition became more structured, providing an appropriate balance between development and increasing levels of challenge.

Futsal

The 2025 Futsal competitions under Capital Football continued to provide a dynamic and fast-paced complement to the outdoor game, with strong engagement across both senior and junior levels.

Aligned with Football Australia's recognition of futsal as a key development format for enhancing technical skill, decision-making, and small-sided game intelligence, the competitions continued to play an important role in the broader player development pathway.

Capital Futsal League

The Capital Futsal League and Junior Capital Futsal League showcased the technical quality and intensity of the indoor format across both senior and youth competitions, with competitive finals series and recognised premiers and champions across all divisions.

The Junior Capital Futsal League featured 42 teams across seven competitions from U12 to U17, with strong participation and evident development across all age groups. The broader Junior Futsal program also saw continued growth, with 176 teams (up from 166 in 2024) competing from mid-October to late December across 20 competitions from U8 to U18.

Senior Futsal League

The 2025 Senior Futsal Leagues delivered a strong and competitive season, underpinned by solid participation numbers and a high standard of play across all divisions. Teams demonstrated skill, commitment and sportsmanship throughout, contributing to an engaging and well-contested competition environment.

The Winter Futsal League ran from late April to early September, with the Women's competition featuring four teams in a highly competitive top division. The Men's competition included 34 teams across four divisions, while the Mixed competition featured five teams, providing a balanced and enjoyable season across all formats.

The Summer Futsal League ran from mid-October to late March and saw continued growth, with 89 teams competing across nine competitions. The Women's League included 20 teams across three divisions, the Men's League featured 58 teams across five divisions, and the Mixed competition included 11 teams. Strong participation and engagement across both seasons highlight the ongoing growth and popularity of futsal within the ACT.

Junior Futsal League

At the junior level, the futsal program continued to play an important role in player development, supporting skill progression and providing structured competition opportunities across a wide range of age groups.

The Junior Futsal League saw continued growth, with 176 teams (up from 166 in 2024) competing from mid-October to late December across 20 competitions from U8 to U18.

This growth reflects the increasing popularity of futsal within the region and its value as a development platform, supporting players of all ability levels to build confidence, improve technical skills, and remain engaged in the game.



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Referees



Referees played a critical role in the delivery of Capital Football competitions in 2025, with officials contributing across all levels of the game from grassroots to elite pathways. A total of 638 match officials registered during the year, including 394 referees and 244 Game Leaders, reflecting strong participation and continued engagement within the officiating community.

A key strength of the 2025 cohort was its youth profile, with 235 referees aged under 18. This highlights the ongoing success of recruitment and development pathways, ensuring a sustainable pipeline of match officials for the future. While overall referee numbers remained stable, retention and registration compliance were identified as areas for continued focus, particularly in ensuring active referees are formally captured within the system.

Education and Pathways

A comprehensive education program was delivered throughout 2025, supporting referees at all stages of their development. This included five Game Leader courses (134 participants), four Junior Football Match Official courses (150 participants, including a female-only course), and three Senior Football Match Official courses.

Additional initiatives included assistant referee crash courses to support clubs and volunteers, as well as futsal referee training. The return of regular in-person education sessions also provided opportunities for referees to learn from experienced officials. These sessions brought referees together to learn from experienced officials and strengthen technical knowledge, while new mentoring initiatives were

introduced to better support junior referees entering the game.

The Capital Football Referee Academy continued to provide a structured development pathway, with 18 participants graduating into higher-level programs or senior football panels, further strengthening the officiating pathway.



Performance and Appointments

Referees from the Capital Football region were appointed across international, national and professional competitions in 2025, including FIFA World Cup Qualifiers, AFC Champions League fixtures and international tournaments. These appointments highlight the continued progression of referees within the ACT.

At the national level, Capital Football referees were appointed across A-League Men's and Women's competitions, Australia Cup fixtures, and national finals. A total of eight ACT-based referees were involved in A-League Men's and Women's competitions during the 2024/25 season, across roles including referees, assistant referees, fourth officials, and VAR. Nathan Shakespear made his A-League Men's debut, while Lauren Hargrave and Georgia Ghirardello were appointed to A-League Women's Finals Series matches.

Referees also featured in Australia Cup Round of 32 fixtures in both on-field and referee coaching roles. Capital Football referees were further represented at national tournaments, including the Emerging Socceroos Championship, Emerging Matildas Championship, and the National Futsal Championship.



At the National Futsal Championship, all Capital Football representatives were appointed to Grand Finals, reflecting the strength of performances across the tournament.



Community and Key Moments

Beyond competition appointments, the referee community remained highly engaged through a range of events and initiatives across the season. Pre-season seminars, fitness programs, and development workshops supported preparation for the year ahead, while major tournaments such as the Kanga Cup and Australian Masters Games provided valuable opportunities for practical experience and development.



The season also included important moments of community connection and reflection. Referees participated in initiatives recognising Female Football Week and were involved in community events supporting charitable causes. The referee community also came together to honour Cameron Shelton, reflecting the strong connection within the group.

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Participation

Capital Football's Game Development offerings continued apace in 2024 with our popular offerings in Walking Football, Powerchair, and All-Abilities creating arenas for more participants to enjoy the global game and creating Capital Football's Inclusivity programs. The organisation also continued to implement the Club Changer program and was proud of the success of our local clubs in achieving their star ratings.

Walking Football

Walking Football continued to be a successful offering by Capital Football, played in the Winter and Summer seasons of 2024. Walking Football was held on Monday nights at Hawker Football Centre, with two timeslots consisting of fifteen teams and 125 participants.

While team participation is the primary way of joining Walking Football, prospective participants can also register as individuals and seek assistance from Capital Football in finding a team for the season. All teams and individuals playing in the competition have played in great spirit, showed admirable sportsmanship, and formed a social community in which they can be active and connect with other people within the ACT community



Powerchair

The Canberra United Powerchair program continued to deliver both on-court and off-court activities throughout 2025, providing inclusive opportunities for participants to engage in football within a structured and supportive environment.

A key development during the year was the transition to a new venue for the 2026 season, with Gold Creek High School confirmed as the program's future home. This move will significantly improve accessibility and allow for year-round training and competition, supporting the ongoing growth and sustainability of the program.

The program was further strengthened through the support of key partners and community organisations. The Rotary Club of Aurora Gungahlin provided a powered storage container to house team equipment and StrikeForce powerchairs, with additional support from Capital Region Muscular Dystrophy and RT Forklift Services assisting in the delivery and installation. These contributions represent an important investment in the long-term capability of the program.

Coaching support remained consistent throughout the year, ensuring regular training opportunities for participants and continued development within the program.

Gala Day

Capital Football hosted a Powerchair Gala Day on Sunday 26 October 2025, bringing together teams from Canberra United, Sydney FC, Hills United, Football St George and Western Sydney Wanderers. The event featured seven matches across the day, providing players with valuable competition experience and the opportunity to test their development against interstate opposition.

The Gala Day was a successful and well-supported event, highlighting the growth of Powerchair football and the strong sense of community within the program. It also provided an important opportunity to strengthen connections across clubs, participants and the broader Powerchair football network.

All-Abilities

The All-Abilities program remained a consistent and well-supported offering, with weekly sessions held throughout the year. The program continued to attract both returning and new participants, providing opportunities to develop football skills, build confidence and connect socially within an inclusive environment.

Capital Football and the AWD team look forward to welcoming more new participants to our inclusive and community-based program with the aim of offering further opportunities to play engage in football.



Female Football Week

Female Football Week is a nationwide, annual initiative that celebrates the growth of women and girls in football at all levels, from grassroots to elite. It aims to promote participation, inclusivity, and leadership, highlighting the contributions of players, coaches, referees, and administrators.

Highlights of the Capital Football Female Football week calendar included:

- **Dads and Daughters Training Session** – 43 families participated in a session for girls aged 5–12, bringing fathers and daughters together through football skills and small-sided games in a fun, inclusive environment.



- **Mums and Daughters Training Session** – 30 families took part in a similar session for girls aged 5–12, providing an opportunity for mothers and daughters to engage in football through skill-based activities and game play.



- **Mother's Day Celebrations** – Canberra Croatia FC hosted their annual Mother's Day fixture, wearing purple kits and inviting players to walk out with an influential woman in their life. Other matches across the region were also encouraged to adopt the initiative.
- **Referee Recognition** – All NPL Senior, Youth and Community League referees wore purple socks throughout the week in support of Female Football Week.

Sporting Schools

The Football Australia Sporting Schools program is designed to increase children's participation in sport, focusing on fun, skill development, and inclusivity. It provides tailored, curriculum-based, and coach-delivered football sessions, often featuring Matildas/Socceroos themes, to primary and secondary schools.

In partnership with Football Australia, Capital Football delivered nine Sporting Schools programs across the region, engaging 1,153 participants. These sessions continue to provide an important entry point into football, supporting skill development and increasing participation at a grassroots level.

Club Changer

Club Changer is Football Australia's Club Development program, which was implemented during 2023. The aim of the program is to support clubs in building sustainable and inclusive environments. The program focuses on strengthening club capability and governance, with a number of clubs achieving recognised accreditation levels throughout 2025.

Strategic Partnerships & Infrastructure



The Strategic Partnerships and Infrastructure function was established in late 2025 to support key strategic priorities across partnerships, government relations, and facilities, with the aim of strengthening long-term outcomes for the football community in the ACT.

During the initial months, the focus was on establishing relationships across the football network, engaging with partners and stakeholders, and identifying priority areas for development. Early progress included the establishment of official supplier partnerships and engagement with Football Australia and other Member Federations to align approaches to facilities planning and advocacy.

Work also commenced on developing a structured approach to facilities and infrastructure planning, including preparation for a comprehensive facility audit in 2026. This work is intended to support a stronger evidence base for future investment and advocacy, particularly given the challenges facing football in securing appropriate infrastructure despite strong participation levels.

In parallel, efforts were made to rebuild and strengthen relationships across government, industry, and the broader community, with a focus on positioning Capital Football as a collaborative and credible partner. Community initiatives and engagement activities also supported this approach, reinforcing connections with the football community and key stakeholders.

In December 2025, Capital Football supported local families through the donation of hundreds of footballs, youth kits and Canberra United match passes. Distributed via community organisations Slabs for Heroes and Pam's Pantry as part of their Christmas hampers initiative, this initiative reflects the organisation's commitment to supporting the wider community.

Looking ahead to 2026, the focus will be on expanding partnerships, completing the facility audit, and progressing a more coordinated and data-driven approach to infrastructure advocacy. This work will be undertaken in collaboration with affiliated clubs, Member Federations, and Football Australia, with the aim of supporting sustainable growth and improved outcomes for football across the ACT.



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Kanga Cup

The 2025 Kanga Cup once again delivered a successful week-long tournament, bringing together teams from across Australia and internationally to compete in a celebration of football built on the principles of fun, friendship and participation.

The tournament culminated on Friday 18 July at Southwell Park in Lyneham, where thirty-four teams were crowned champions across their respective age groups. Finals Day provided a fitting conclusion to the competition, with matches played across multiple pitches showcasing a high standard of play, including strong attacking performances, disciplined defending, and standout goalkeeping.

The event continued to highlight the scale and importance of the Kanga Cup within the football calendar, made possible through the support of volunteers, staff and the broader football community. The tournament remains a key opportunity to bring participants together and reinforce the values of connection and enjoyment within the game.

With loads of goals, remarkable defensive efforts, and some magnificent goalkeeping, the Finals had it all across the entirety of the day and multiple pitches.

These programs provided accessible entry points for new coaches, while also supporting the ongoing development of those already engaged in the game.

Community courses and advanced coaching qualifications were delivered across the year, including C-Diploma and B-Diploma programs, ensuring continued progression within the coaching pathway. Workshops and professional development opportunities were also provided, supporting coaches to enhance their knowledge and practical application across all levels of the game.

At the conclusion of 2025, Capital Football, with the support of Football Australia, delivered a female-only C Diploma course. This initiative represented an important step in strengthening female coaching pathways and increasing opportunities for women within the game.



Talent Development Scheme

In its second year of operation, the Talent Development Scheme (TDS) continued to provide players with the opportunity to supplement their club training within a structured high-performance environment. Aligned with Football Australia's TDS guidelines, the program aims to support equitable player and coaching pathways, ensuring talented players are provided with consistent development opportunities.

The program operated across male and female cohorts in U14, U15 and U16 age groups, with sessions delivered weekly from February to October. The 2025 program was expanded, increasing to a 34-week schedule and providing an additional 10 weeks of training compared to 2024. Alongside technical training, players had access to fitness testing, individual conditioning programs, physiotherapy and strength and conditioning support, as well as specialist goalkeeper coaching.

A total of 75 players participated in the full 34-week TDS program, including 20 female and 55 male players across U14, U15 and U16 age groups, with the majority of participants in the U14 cohort. Two development camps were also delivered during school holiday periods, providing additional high-performance training opportunities.

An additional 11-week TDS program was introduced mid-year, offering a pathway for players not previously involved in the program following the National Youth Championships. Running from July to October, the program attracted 46 participants (16 female and 30 male) and supported broader access into the high-performance environment.

ID Cup

Capital Football participated in the U14 ID Cup hosted by Football Victoria, providing players with valuable interstate competition experience in the absence of a national championship for this age group. The U14 Boys team, selected from the TDS program, competed against representative teams from South Australia, Tasmania and Victoria.

The team performed strongly across the tournament, ultimately finishing as runners-up following a penalty shootout in the Grand Final against Country Victoria. Due to limited participation numbers, a U14 Girls team was unable to be fielded.

High Performance Camp

The High Performance Camp was delivered as an extension of the TDS framework, providing a seven-week intensive program designed to replicate the demands and environment of Emerging Championships preparation. The program focused on technical development and preparing players for future representative opportunities, including upcoming trials in January 2026.

Participants experienced a high-performance training environment, with both morning and evening sessions delivered each week to support individual skill development and readiness for representative football.

Emerging Soccerroos

Capital Football was represented at the 2025 Emerging Soccerroos Championships with Under 15 and Under 16 Boys squads, competing against leading talent from across Australia and international opposition. The Championships were held at the Home of the Matildas, Victoria from 6–10 July. Capital Football was also represented by match officials, with Harold Spanner and Aisha Strutt appointed to the tournament.



The Under 15 team was coached by Grant Barlow (Head Coach) and Michael Marin (Assistant Coach). They finished 13th overall, showing steady improvement across the tournament following a challenging start in a competitive pool. After an opening loss, the squad demonstrated resilience to secure a draw against Malaysia before finishing strongly with convincing wins over NSW Country and Tasmania. Goal scoring contributions were shared across the group, reflecting balanced attacking output.

Across both age groups, the Championships provided valuable exposure to high-level competition, supporting the continued development of players within the Capital Football pathway.

National Futsal Championships

Capital Football was represented at the 2025 National Futsal Championships in Melbourne in January, with teams competing across a wide range of age groups and divisions. The Championships are the largest futsal event in Australia, bringing together teams from all Member Federations and providing a key platform within the national futsal pathway.

Whilst these results were previously referenced in the 2024 Annual Report, the competition relates to 2025 and is formally recognised here.

Capital Football entered teams in Open Men, Open Women (Blue and Gold), U12 Boys (Blue and Gold), U13 Boys, U13 Girls, U14 Boys, U15 Girls and U17 Girls divisions. The tournament provided players with the opportunity to compete against the best futsal talent from across the country in a high-intensity, representative environment.

Notably, the Open Women's Blue team secured the National Championship title, completing the tournament undefeated and defeating NSW Thunder in the Grand Final, with Stella De Marco scoring the match-winning goal.

Across the week, teams produced a number of strong performances, highlighting the technical quality and depth within the Capital Football futsal pathway. The Championships also provided valuable development opportunities for players, coaches and officials, contributing to the continued growth of futsal within the ACT.

Participation in the National Futsal Championships remains a key component of the player pathway, offering exposure to national-level competition and supporting the progression of players into higher performance environments.

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Canberra United

Season Review

Season 17 of the Liberty A-League Women marked a significant step forward for Canberra United, with the club returning to finals football and finishing fifth on the ladder under new Head Coach Antoni Jagarinec. The 2024/25 campaign was the largest in the competition's history, with an expanded 23-round season providing increased opportunities for performance and engagement with the club's strong supporter base.

In his first season in charge, Jagarinec led a squad that combined experienced players with emerging talent, building cohesion and resilience across the campaign. Despite a disrupted lead-in to the season, the group demonstrated strong character and consistency to secure a place in the finals, achieving a key objective and marking a return to post-season football.

The season also highlighted Canberra United's continued commitment to player development. Three local players – Jaya Bowman, Tianah Miro and Ivana Galic - made their A-League Women's debuts, while seven players made their club debuts, strengthening the depth and diversity of the squad. These opportunities reinforce the club's role in supporting player progression within the national pathway.

A number of individual milestones were also achieved throughout the season. Captain Michelle Heyman reached two significant benchmarks, scoring her 100th goal for Canberra United and making her 200th A-League Women's appearance. Additional milestones included 50-game appearances for Hayley Taylor-Young, Sofia Christopherson and Mary Stanic-Floody, as well as Emma Robers, Maya Markovski and Bethany Gordon, recognising their ongoing contribution to the club.

The season was underpinned by the efforts of a dedicated group of staff, volunteers and supporters, whose commitment continues to play a vital role in the delivery of the program. Strong support at McKellar Park throughout the season contributed to a positive matchday environment and reinforced the club's connection to the Canberra community.

While the return to finals football represents a significant achievement, the season also highlighted the importance of continued development and long-term sustainability within an evolving professional landscape. Capital Football is actively working with key stakeholders to support a sustainable future model for Canberra United and ensure the continued presence of elite women's football in the region.

Directors have been in office since the start of the financial year to the date of this report, unless otherwise stated.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of Capital Football during the financial year continued to include the administration, development and promotion of football in all its forms across Canberra and the surrounding region.

Review of operations

Capital Football reported a total comprehensive deficit of \$71,252 (2024 profit: \$91,076).

This result reflects the continued impact of supporting Canberra United, our A-League Women's team, during a period of uncertainty regarding the team's future. The deficit was further influenced by changes to funding arrangements associated with the operation of Canberra United, with funding received through the Australian Professional Leagues (APL) reduced following the commencement of the 2024-25 season, resulting in approximately \$83,000 of budgeted funding not being received within the 2025 financial year. The winding up of Gungahlin United FC during the year contributed to the overall result as the Federation had to write off \$50,199 owed by the club.

Uncertainty around ownership persisted throughout the year. While the APL had previously outlined expansion opportunities, no ownership group was confirmed in time for the 2025-26 season. Although there were interested parties, none progressed to the final stages.

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DIRECTORS' REPORT

Following late notification that a buyer would not be secured, Capital Football again worked with the ACT Government to obtain the support required to ensure Canberra United's continued participation for the 2025-26 season. This approach was taken in the context of ongoing discussions with prospective ownership groups, with the intention of maintaining the team's continuity while a long-term solution was progressed.

Capital Football remains grateful for the ACT Government's ongoing support, which has been critical in enabling the team to continue operating during this period.

While Capital Football has successfully operated Canberra United since 2008, it is not the Federation's long-term role to manage a professional team. Support will continue through the 2025-26 season, while continuing efforts to secure an appropriate ownership group.

In 2025, Capital Football focused on stabilising operations and consolidating its position following a period of change, while continuing to deliver and grow participation and community football across the ACT, alongside the ongoing demands associated with supporting Canberra United.

A major focus throughout the year was the development of the Federation's new Strategic Plan. This process represented one of the most comprehensive consultation programs undertaken in recent years, engaging clubs, stakeholders and the broader football community to help shape the future direction of the game. In developing the new strategy, reflection on the previous 2020–2023 plan identified that several objectives remained incomplete, reinforcing the need for a refreshed and more focused approach. The new plan places a strong emphasis on sustainability, inclusion and long-term growth.

In parallel, Capital Football worked closely with clubs to develop the Behaviour Standards program. This collaborative approach will focus on educating members on expected and acceptable behaviours, rather than relying on enforcement alone. It also provides clear guidance on how clubs and participants can actively support positive environments. The program is aimed at driving long-term cultural change across the game, ensuring football remains a safe, inclusive and welcoming environment – and continues to be the sport of choice for everyone across the ACT.

Participation across the ACT remained strong in 2025, with total engagement reaching 40,311. Outdoor affiliated football accounted for 19,425 participants across 50 clubs, including 13,748 male participants and 5,646 female participants. Women and girls' participation totalled 8,194 across all formats of the game, representing 15% growth on the previous year and continuing a positive trend.

Beyond traditional formats, the game continued to diversify and expand its reach. Futsal (3,380 participants), Social Football (4,329 participants), Schools programs (1,404 participants), and Community Events and Promotional Experiences (7,866 participants) all contributed to broadening access and engagement across the community.

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DIRECTORS' REPORT

The Capital Futsal League entered its fourth season under more constrained conditions. Rising venue costs and fluctuating participation required several difficult decisions, including the removal of streaming and adjustments to referee match fees. Changes in club participation and team numbers also led to a revised competition structure, with the 2025 season operating as a single division and some clubs entering multiple teams. Capital Football acknowledges the referees for their support in working collaboratively to ensure the competition could be delivered.

In 2025, Capital Football released the findings of a review of the National Premier Leagues (NPL) competition structure. This process generated significant discussion across the football community, reflecting the importance of the competition to clubs and stakeholders.

The review was focused on strengthening the long-term sustainability and competitiveness of the NPL, ensuring it continues to provide a high-quality environment for players, clubs and officials. Subsequent changes to the competition landscape required adjustments to implementation. However, the underlying principles of the review were maintained, with a continued focus on the long-term viability and integrity of the competition.

During the year, one of the Federation's largest clubs, Gungahlin United FC, ceased operations, representing a significant loss to the football community in the ACT, particularly within the Gungahlin region.

In response, Capital Football worked with the local community, releasing Expressions of Interest to support clubs in expanding or establishing programs to ensure continuity of football opportunities and minimise disruption for participants.

While the loss is deeply felt, it has provided important learnings. Capital Football has commenced a review of relevant policies and will continue to refine these following the release of the liquidator's report, with the aim of strengthening governance and reducing the likelihood of similar outcomes in the future.

The Kanga Cup once again demonstrated its significance to both the football community and the ACT economy. The 2025 tournament featured 358 teams and approximately 5,000 participants, including teams from across Australia – NSW, SA and WA – as well as international teams from New Zealand and the Philippines. ACT Government economic modelling estimates the event generated just over \$7.5M in economic benefit, reinforcing its importance during a typically quieter period of the year.

Significant Changes in State of Affairs

No significant changes in the Federation's state of affairs during the financial year.

After Balance Date Events

At the time of reporting, no matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year that have significantly affected, or may significantly affect, the operations of the Federation, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of Capital Football in future financial years.

Short and long-term objectives

The Federation's long-term objective is expressed in its stated purpose to provide high quality experiences for everyone involved in football in all its forms, with the associated vision to be the most inclusive and respected sport in Canberra and the Capital Region.

Key short term strategic objectives include achieving improvements and growth in the following areas of operation:

- Participation – continued growth at all levels (e.g. age, gender) and across all formats of the game (e.g. 11-a-side, Futsal, social and community football).
- Talented & Elite – supporting development pathways and representative programs, including participant numbers and team performance (e.g. TSP, Canberra United).
- Community Engagement – strengthening connection with participants, clubs and the broader community, including attendance, experiences and digital engagement.
- Governance and Sustainability – strengthening governance frameworks, improving financial sustainability and supporting the long-term viability of clubs and competitions.

Strategy for achieving the objectives

The strategies for achieving these objectives are framed by the Federation's Constitutional Objects, including governance, administration and protection of football, collaboration with Football Australia and members, promotion and management of representative programs, provision of facilities, and a commitment to equality and inclusion.

While the previous Strategic Plan covered the period 2020-23 and was due for renewal, its core pillars continued to guide the Federation's activities during 2025 as a transitional framework while a new Strategic Plan was developed.

- Govern and Guide – employing good governance practices and building club capability through the sharing of best practice.
- Connect and Engage – maintaining strong relationships across the football community, including clubs, participants, officials and stakeholders.

- Play and Perform – providing competitions and opportunities for participation across all levels of the game.
- Educate and Enhance – supporting development pathways for players, referees, coaches and administrators.
- Thrive and Prosper – supporting financial sustainability and the ongoing viability of the game.

How principal activities assisted in achieving the objectives

- **Govern and Guide** – Capital Football continued to meet its governance and compliance requirements during the reporting period. A major focus in 2025 was the consultation and development of a new Strategic Plan, shaped through broad engagement across the football community, which will guide the organisation's future direction following its release.
- **Connect and Engage** – Capital Football worked closely with clubs in the development of the Behaviour Standards program, supporting a proactive and education-based approach to positive behaviour and long-term cultural change across the game.
- **Play and Perform** – Capital Football administered competitions including National Premier League, Capital Premier League, Senior and Junior Leagues, MiniRoos, and futsal competitions. Game Development programs in Powerchair, All-Abilities and Walking Football continued to expand access to the game. Total participation in 2025 reached 40,311 across all formats.
- **Educate and Enhance** – Representative teams competed at the Futsal Nationals and National Youth Championships. The broader football ecosystem was supported by 1,244 registered coaches, 684 referees and 1,464 volunteers, highlighting the strength of the football community.
- **Thrive and Prosper** – Capital Football acknowledges its corporate partners, whose ongoing support contributes to the sustainability and accessibility of football across the ACT.

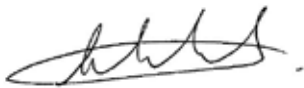

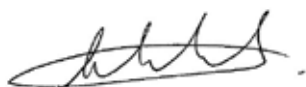

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

The financial report is for ACT Football Federation Limited as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in the Australian Capital Territory. The Federation is a company limited by guarantee.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures, Interpretations of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the *Corporations Act 2001*.

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars which is the Federation's functional and presentation currency. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

A number of new or revised Australian Accounting Standards are effective for the first time in the current financial year.

These standards have had no material impact on the entity.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Federation in the preparation of the financial statements. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue

Revenue recognised under AASB 15 is measured at the amount which the Federation expects to receive in consideration for satisfying performance obligations to a customer. A performance obligation is the distinct good or service defined within the contract with a customer. The transaction price is allocated to one or more performance obligations contained within the contract, with revenue being recognised as or when the performance obligation is satisfied.

NOTE 1. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION (Continued)

(a) Revenue (Continued)

While the Federation acknowledges the contributions made by volunteers in its continued operations, the difficulty and significant cost associated with trying to reliably measure these contributions means that the Federation has elected not to record these amounts in its financial statements.

Timing of Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised either at a point in time or over time, when (or as) the entity satisfies performance obligations by transferring the promised goods or services to its customers.

If the entity satisfies a performance obligation before it receives the consideration, the entity recognises either a contract asset or a receivable in its statement of financial position, depending on whether something other than the passage of time is required before the consideration is due.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

(c) Inventories

Inventories consist of football equipment and promotional materials which are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(d) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair values as indicated, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost are valued at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets is depreciated on a declining-balance method basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements, whichever best reflects the expected utilisation of the asset.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

Asset classes carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposal of assets are determined by comparing the proceeds on sale with the carrying amount of the asset. These gains or losses are included in the income statement. When a revalued asset is sold, amounts previously credited to the Asset Revaluation Reserve relating to that asset are transferred to Retained Earnings.

(e) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Federation reviews the carrying values of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the Income Statement.

Where future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the entity would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is depreciated replacement cost of an asset.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an asset class, the Federation estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the class of asset belongs.

(f) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Federation's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the reporting date. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year together with benefits arising from wages, salaries and annual leave which may be settled after one year, have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Other employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the net present value.

Contributions are made by the Federation to an employee's superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(g) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Federation has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(h) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the entity are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised, recording an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values.

Leased assets are depreciated on a diminishing-balance basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the entity will obtain ownership of the asset. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

(i) Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the Federation commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (i.e., trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through profit or loss' in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately.

Classification and subsequent measurement

Finance instruments are subsequently measured at either fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest rate method or cost. *Fair value* represents the amount for which an asset could be exchanged or a liability settled, between knowledgeable, willing parties. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Amortised cost is calculated as:

- i. the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition;
- ii. less principal repayments;
- iii. plus or minus the cumulative amortisation of the difference, if any, between the amount initially recognised and the maturity amount calculated using the *effective interest method*; and
- iv. less any reduction for impairment.

The *effective interest method* is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life (or when this cannot be reliably predicted, the contractual term) of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying value with a consequential recognition of an income or expense in profit or loss.

(i) *Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss*

Financial assets are classified at 'fair value through profit or loss' when they are held for trading for the purpose of short-term profit taking, or where they are derivatives not held for hedging purposes, or when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying value being included in profit or loss.

(ii) *Loans and receivables*

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

(iii) *Held-to-maturity investments*

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the entity's intention to hold these investments to maturity.

(iv) *Available-for-sale financial assets*

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are either not capable of being classified into other categories of financial assets due to their nature, or they are designated as such by management. They comprise investments in the equity of other entities where there is neither a fixed maturity nor fixed or determinable payments.

(v) Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities (excluding financial guarantees) are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are either discharged, cancelled or expired. The difference between the carrying value of the financial liability, which is extinguished or transferred to another party and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of noncash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

(j) Taxation

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Federation is exempt from income tax under Section 50.45 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense.

Receivables and payables in the Statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST. Cash flows are presented in the Statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(k) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(l) Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the company.

Key estimates – Impairment

The Federation assesses impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Federation that may lead to impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Fair value less costs to sell or current replacement cost calculations performed in assessing recoverable amounts incorporate a number of key estimates.
